Explanation of Duties:

A Duty Roster must be created by the Patrol Leader at the beginning of every campout. Fairness is critical to your success! The Duty Roster must be posted in the patrol campsite for duration of campout. The Patrol Leader does not typically fill a specific spot on the duty roster – His job is to supervise, teach, and if need be, help, so that all duties get done.

Head Cook: Wash hands. Start meal preparations duties on time. Serve all of the meal components as planned on the menu. Determine recipes, assign responsibilities to assistant cook, prepare meals, advise Patrol when meal will be served, and ensure all utensils used for cooking are clean. Try to avoid making excess mess for the dishwashers.

Assistant Cook: Assist with meal preparation as determined by cook, prepare hand washing station with warm water and rinse water (use same tubs used for cleanup).

Fire Warden: Ensure fire buckets are full (water and dirt), and as applicable: 1) Light camp stove and ensure it is clean afterwards; or 2) Arrange or clean fire pit in accordance with Scout policy. Find and stack wood needed for fire or start charcoal if needed. Start fire early enough to ensure cooking coals are ready in time to prepare meal. Continue to maintain fire until all dishwater for clean-up has been made. Ensure fire is completely out when no longer needed.

Water Man: Keep water jug full and refill when needed. Fill fire buckets (Fire Warden will double check). Fetch all necessary water to the patrol campsite. Be sure cooks have all water needed to prepare the meal, including beverage for mealtime. Heat water for all dishwashing and cleanup duties. This job begins while the meal is cooking (start dishwater – in big galvanized bucket) while meal is cooking or immediately when food is done. This job does not end until the last dish has been washed and sterilized (with boiling hot water).

Kitchen Cleanup: This job begins by setting up the three basins (for 3 pot cleaning method). These people are not responsible for heating water. The clean-up people are responsible for cleaning patrol cooking pots and utensils, the stove, the patrol boxes, and the general cooking/eating area. Although they are not responsible for washing individual eating gear, they do need to make sure that the three wash tubs are usable (clean and HOT water) for personal dishes. Wash all *non-personal* utensils and cooking equipment (*Each Scout washes their own personal gear*). Clean table and secure Patrol box. Notify Quartermaster if any supplies are needed.

Assistant Kitchen Cleanup: Assist with the washing of all *non-personal* utensils and cooking equipment. Clean table and secure Patrol box. Oil Dutch Oven if used. Notify Quartermaster if any supplies are needed.

Patrol Site Cleanup: Set up garbage bags and secure camp gadgets. Secure garbage bags at night and start new one when current one is full.

Patrol Members: Help or stay out of the way. Wash their own dishes prior to the patrol gear. Do their fair share of the work – without whining or complaining.

Other Patrol Responsibilities: The whole patrol should share campsite set up. The first item set up is always the dining fly and then the individual tents. The patrol must secure their food within their patrol box or another securable container. Build a fire ring if patrol fire rings will be used. Gather wood for the weekend. Build any camp gadgets agreed upon by the patrol. At the conclusion of the camp out, the site should be returned to the same condition it was in with all trash carried out and brush returned where possible. Remember – Leave No Trace!
